Introduction

WHY THIS DIRECTORY IS NEEDED

More than one third of America's population today has either direct or indirect ties to the armed services. This includes more than 25 million veterans, 3 million active-duty military personnel, and millions of their family members (spouses, parents, children, grandchildren, and other descendants).

Over the years, a number of organizations have attempted to reward the members of these groups in a variety of ways. In 1944, Congress established the Veterans Administration (now called the Department of Veterans Affairs) to develop programs for the benefit of the men and women who served in previous wars. Today, the DVA provides a wide variety of funding opportunities to veterans and their families. Many state governments have also established or expanded programs that complement federal benefits. In addition, voluntary and other private organizations (most notably the American Legion) have raised millions of dollars to provide financial aid to their members, other veterans or military personnel, or their family members. Similarly, to recruit, retain, and reward their personnel (especially since the advent of the all-volunteer military), the armed services have developed wide-ranging benefits for members and those who are related to them. In all, billions of dollars a year are now set aside in the form of publicly- and privately-funded scholarships, fellowships, grants-in-aid, and other sources of financial aid for veterans, military personnel, and their family members.

While numerous print and online listings have been prepared to identify and describe general financial aid opportunities (those open to all segments of society), none of those resources have ever covered more than a small portion of the programs available primarily or exclusively for veterans, military personnel, or their family members. That's why Gail A. Schlachter and R. David Weber biennially issue *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families*, which identifies billions of dollars set aside for individuals with ties to the military to support study, research, creative activities, travel, career development, emergencies, and much more.

WHAT'S UNIQUE ABOUT THE DIRECTORY?

Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families is the first and only publication to provide comprehensive information on the more than 1,400 programs aimed specifically at those with ties to the military. The listings in the 2012-2014 edition of this book cover every major field of study, are sponsored by more than 550 different private and public agencies and organizations, and are open to all levels of applicants—from high school students, to college students, to professionals and others. By using this biennially-issued directory, the one out of three Americans eligible for military-related benefits (and the counselors, advisers, and librarians who are there to serve them) can easily identify the vast array of available funding programs. And, not only does *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families* provide the most comprehensive coverage of available funding, it also displays the most informative program descriptions (on the average, more than twice the detail found in any other listing).

In addition to this extensive and focused coverage, the directory offers several other unique features. First of all, hundreds of funding opportunities listed here have never been covered in any other source. So, even if you have checked elsewhere, you will want to look at *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families* for additional leads. Further, all the funding described here is substantial; every program offers at least \$1,000, and many award \$20,000 or more or pay all college expenses. And, here's another plus: all of the funding programs in this edition of the directory offer "free" money;

not one of the programs will ever require you to pay anything back (provided, of course, that you meet the program requirements).

Unlike other funding directories, which generally follow a straight alphabetical arrangement, *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families* groups entries by both type of program (e.g., scholarships, grants-in-aid) and recipient groups (veterans, military personnel, and their family members)—thus making it easy to pinpoint appropriate programs. The same convenience is offered in the indexes, where the entries are also subdivided by program type and recipient group. With this arrangement, users with one set of characteristics (e.g., veterans) will be able to find all programs set aside specifically for them—and not be distracted or have to waste time sorting through descriptions of programs intended for members of the other groups.

In fact, everything about the directory has been designed to make your search for funding as easy as possible. You can identify programs not only by recipient group, but by program title, sponsoring organizations, where you live, where you want to spend the money, specific subject areas, and even deadline date (so fundseekers working within specific time constraints can locate programs that are still open). Plus, you'll find all the information you need to decide if a program is a match for you: purpose, eligibility requirements, financial data, duration, special features, limitations, number awarded, and application deadline. You even get fax numbers, toll-free numbers, e-mail addresses, and web site locations (when available), along with complete contact information, to make your requests for applications proceed smoothly.

The unique value of *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families* has been consistently praised by the reviewers. *Reference Book Review* wrote, "This is the most comprehensive guide available on the subject of financial aid for those with ties to the military." The directory was "enthusiastically reviewed" by *American Reference Books Annual* (which judged it to be "exceptionally useful"), was called "comprehensive" and "authoritative" by *Midwest Book Review*, and was pronounced "easy to use" by *College & Research Library News*. In the view of *Booklist*, "This book fills a noteworthy gap" and libraries across the country "should make this well-conceived and useful information source a part of their reference collection." Perhaps Military.com summed it up best: "the definitive source."

WHAT'S EXCLUDED?

While this book is intended to be the most comprehensive source of information on funding available to veterans, military personnel, and their family members, there are some programs we've specifically excluded from the directory:

- *Awards open equally to all segments of the population.* Only funding opportunities set aside specifically for those with ties to the military are covered here.
- *Programs administered by individual academic institutions solely for their own students.* The directory identifies "portable" programs—ones that can be used at any number of schools. Financial aid administered by individual schools specifically for their own students is not covered. Write directly to the schools you are considering to get information on their offerings.
- *Service or nonmonetary programs for veterans, military personnel, and their family members.* To obtain information about service programs' benefits (e.g., job counseling, medical and dental care, treatment for alcohol or drug dependency) or nonmonetary benefits (such as burial flags, presidential certificates, or complimentary licenses for hunting and fishing), check with your state veteran's agency, your local DVA office, or the most recent annual edition of the DVA's *Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents*.
- *Indirect aid programs,* where funds go to military-related agencies rather than directly to veterans, military personnel, or their family members. To obtain that information, check with your state veteran's agency or your local DVA office.

- (4) **Summary** To provide funding to veterans working on a bachelor's or graduate degree in a computer-related field.
- (5) **Eligibility** This program is open to sophomores, juniors, seniors, and graduate students at U.S. colleges and universities who are veterans (must possess a DD-214) and were honorably discharged or are still in good standing with their branch of service. Applicants must be working full time on a degree in computer science, computer engineering, or a closely-related technical field (e.g., software engineering, electrical engineering (with a heavy computer science course load), information systems, information technology, applied networking, or system administration). Along with their application, they must submit a 1,000-word personal statement that covers their reasons for applying for this scholarship, their reasons for choosing their major, their professional objectives as they relate to their degree, their role as a leader in their community and/or chapter, and any additional community service initiatives in which they have been involved. Financial need is not considered in the selection process..
- (6) **Financial data** The stipend is \$10,000.
- (7) **Duration** 1 year.
- (8) **Additional information** This program is sponsored by Google.
- (9) **Number awarded** 8 each year.
- (10) **Deadline** March of each year.

DEFINITION

- (1) **Entry number:** Consecutive number that is given to each entry and used to identify the entry in the index.
- (2) **Program title:** Title of scholarship, fellowship, grant-in-aid, or other source of free money described in the directory.
- (3) **Sponsoring organization:** Name, address, telephone number, toll-free number, fax number, e-mail address, and/or web site (when information was supplied) for the organization sponsoring the program.
- (4) **Summary:** Identifies the major program requirements; read the rest of the entry for additional detail.
- (5) **Eligibility:** Describes qualifications required of applicants, application procedures, and selection process.
- (6) **Financial data:** Financial details of the program, including fixed sum, average amount, or range of funds offered, expenses for which funds may and may not be applied, and cash-related benefits supplied (e.g., room and board).
- (7) **Duration:** Period for which support is provided; renewal prospects.
- (8) **Additional information:** Any unusual (generally nonmonetary) benefits, restrictions, or requirements associated with the program.
- (9) **Number awarded:** Total number of recipients each year or other specified period.
- (10) **Deadline:** The month by which applications must be submitted.

- *Money for study or research outside the United States.* Since there are comprehensive and up-to-date directories that describe the funding available for study and research abroad (particularly Reference Service Press's biennial *Financial Aid for Study and Training Abroad* and *Financial Aid for Research and Creative Activities Abroad*), only programs that support study, research, or other activities in the United States are covered here.
- *Restrictive geographic coverage.* In general, programs are excluded if they are open only to residents of a narrow geographic area (anything below the state level). To get information on these geographically restrictive programs, contact Reference Service Press directly or use *RSP FundingFinder*, Reference Service Press's subscription-based online funding database.
- *Programs offering limited financial support.* Comprehensive coverage is provided in this directory only for programs that can substantively impact the financial situation of veterans, military personnel, and their family members. Scholarships, fellowships, and grants-in-aid must pay at least \$1,000 a year or they are not included here. Also excluded are programs that offer military personnel the opportunity to pursue college training but do not provide any financial support beyond their current salary. For information on these more limited programs, contact Reference Service Press directly or use *RSP FundingFinder*.
- *Money that must be repaid.* Only "free money" is identified here. If a program requires repayment or charges interest, it's not listed. Now you can find out about billions of dollars in aid and know (if you meet the program requirements) that not one dollar of that will ever need to be repaid.

WHAT'S UPDATED?

The preparation of each new edition of *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families* involves extensive updating and revision. To insure that the information included in the directory is both reliable and current, the editors at Reference Service Press 1) reviewed and updated all relevant programs covered in the previous edition of the directory, 2) collected information on all programs open to veterans, military personnel, and their families that were added to Reference Service Press' funding database since the last edition of the directory, and then 3) searched extensively for new program leads in a variety of sources, including printed directories, news reports, journals, newsletters, house organs, annual reports, and sites on the Internet. We only include program descriptions that are written directly from information supplied by the sponsoring organization in print or online (no information is ever taken from secondary sources). When that information could not be found, we sent up to four collection letters (followed by up to three telephone or email inquiries, if necessary) to those sponsors. Despite our best efforts, however, some sponsoring organizations still failed to respond and, as a result, their programs are not included in this edition of the directory.

The 2012-2014 edition of the directory completely revises and updates the earlier biennial edition. Programs that have ceased operations have been dropped. Profiles of continuing programs have been rewritten to reflect operations in 2012-2014; nearly 80% of these programs reported substantive changes in their locations, requirements (particularly application deadline), or benefits since 2010. In addition, more than 450 new entries have been added to the program section of the directory. The resulting listing presents the 1,400+ biggest and best sources of free money available to those with ties to the military, including scholarships, fellowships, and grants-in-aid.

HOW THE DIRECTORY IS ORGANIZED

Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families is divided into two separate sections: 1) a descriptive list of financial aid programs designed primarily or exclusively for veterans, military personnel, and their family members; and 2) a set of six indexes to help you find the funding you need.

Funding Available to Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families. The first section of the directory describes 1,428 financial aid programs set aside primarily or exclusively for those with ties to the military. Entries in this section are grouped into the following three categories to guide readers in their search for a specific kind of financial assistance:

- **Scholarships:** Programs that support studies at the undergraduate level in the United States. Money is available to entering or continuing students in any type of public or private postsecondary institution, ranging from technical schools and community colleges to major universities in the United States.
- **Fellowships:** Programs that support study, research, projects, or other activities for entering or continuing graduate students as well as professionals and postdoctorates in the United States.
- **Grants-in-Aid:** Programs that provide financial assistance for property and income tax liabilities, travel, emergency situations, service in dangerous military zones, burial costs, loan repayment, etc.

Each of these three categories is further divided into three recipient groupings: veterans, military personnel, and their family members (children, spouses, parents, grandchildren, other relatives, etc.). Within these subdivisions, entries are arranged by program title. Programs that supply more than one type of assistance or assistance to more than one specific group are listed in all relevant subsections. For example, both undergraduate *and* graduate family members may apply for the Chan-Padgett Special Forces Memorial Scholarship, so that program is described in the "Families" section of both the Scholarship *and* Fellowship chapters.

Each program entry in the directory has been designed to provide a concise profile that includes information (when available) on program title, organization address, telephone numbers (including toll-free and fax numbers), e-mail addresses and web site, purpose, eligibility, money awarded, duration, special features, limitations, number of awards, and application deadline (see the sample entry on page 7).

The information reported for each of the programs in this section was gathered from research conducted through the first half of 2012. While the listing is intended to cover as comprehensively as possible the biggest and best sources of free money available to veterans, military personnel, and their families, some sponsoring organizations did not post information online or respond to our research inquiries and, consequently, are not included in this edition of the directory.

Indexes. To help you find the aid you need, we have constructed six indexes; these will let you access the listings by program title, sponsoring organization, residency, tenability, subject focus, and deadline date. These indexes use a word-by-word alphabetical arrangement. Note: numbers in the index refer to entry numbers, not to page numbers in the book.

Program Title Index. If you know the name of a particular funding program and want to find out where it is covered in the directory, use the Program Title Index. To assist you in your search, every program is listed by all its known names, former names, and abbreviations. Since one program can be listed in more than one subsection (e.g., a program providing assistance to veterans at both the undergraduate and graduate levels is listed in two subsections), each entry number in the index has been coded to indicate program type (e.g., S = Scholarships) and the intended recipient group (e.g., V = Veterans). By using this coding system, readers can turn directly to the programs that match their financial needs and eligibility characteristics.

Sponsoring Organization Index. This index provides an alphabetical listing of the 550 agencies that offer funding to veterans, military personnel, and their families. As in the Program Title Index, entry numbers have been coded to indicate both program type and recipient group.

Residency Index. Some programs listed in this book are restricted to veterans, military personnel, or their families in a particular state or region. Others are open to those with ties to the military wherever they live. This index helps you identify programs available only to residents in your area as well as programs that have no residency requirements. Further, to assist you in your search, we've also indicated the program types and recipient groups eligible for the funding offered to residents in each of the areas listed in the index.

Tenability Index. This index identifies the geographic locations where the funding described in the directory may be used. Index entries (city, county, state, region) are arranged alphabetically and subdivided by program type and recipient group. Use this index when you or your family members are looking for money to support research, study, or other activities in a particular geographic area.

Subject Index. This index allows the reader to use more than 250 subject headings to identify the subject focus of each of the financial aid opportunities designed primarily or exclusively for veterans, military personnel, and their families listed in the first section of the directory. Extensive "see" and "see also" references are provided to aid in the search for appropriate funding.

Calendar Index. Since most financial aid programs have specific deadline dates, some may have closed by the time you begin to look for funding. You can use the Calendar Index to determine which programs are still open. This index is arranged by recipient group and divided by program type (e.g., scholarships, grants-in-aid) and month during which the deadline falls. Filing dates can and quite often do vary from year to year; consequently, this index should be used only as a guide for deadlines beyond 2014.

HOW TO USE THE DIRECTORY

Here are some tips to help you get the most out of the funding opportunities listed in this edition of *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families*.

To Locate Programs Offering a Particular Type of Assistance. If you are looking for programs offering a particular type of funding (e.g., a scholarship for undergraduate courses, a grant-in-aid for emergency situations), turn to the appropriate category in the first section (scholarships, fellowships, or grants-in-aid) and read through all the entries in the subsection that applies (i.e., veterans, military personnel, or family members). Since programs with multiple purposes are listed in every appropriate location, each of the three target population subsections functions as a self-contained entity. In fact, you can browse through any of the sections or subsections in the directory without first consulting an index.

To Find Information on a Particular Financial Aid Program. If you know the name of a particular financial aid program, the type of assistance offered by the program (e.g., fellowship, grant-in-aid) and the intended recipients (veterans, military personnel, or family members), then go directly to the appropriate category in the first section of the directory, where you will find the program profiles arranged alphabetically by title. But be careful: program titles can be misleading. The Air Force Health Professions Scholarship Program is available only to graduate students and therefore is listed under Fellowships not Scholarships. The Anne M. Gannett Award for Veterans is actually a scholarship, as is the Massachusetts Public Service Grant Program. Consequently, if you are looking for a specific program and do not find it in the subsection you have checked, be sure to refer to the Program Title Index to see if it is covered elsewhere in the directory. To save time, always check the Program Title Index first if you know the name of a specific award but are not sure under which subsection it would be listed.

To Locate Programs Sponsored by a Particular Organization. The Sponsoring Organization Index makes it easy to determine groups that provide financial assistance to veterans, military personnel, and their families, or to identify specific financial aid programs offered by a particular organization. Each entry number in the index is coded to identify program type and recipient group, so that you can quickly target appropriate entries.

To Browse Quickly Through the Listings. Turn to the type of funding and recipient sections that interest you and read the "Summary" paragraph in each entry. In seconds, you'll know if this is an opportunity that might apply to you. If it is, read the rest of the information in the entry to make sure you meet all of the program requirements before writing or going online for an application form. Please, save your time and energy. Don't apply if you don't qualify!

To Locate Programs Open to Residents of or Tenable in a Particular Area. The Residency Index identifies financial aid programs open to veterans, military personnel, or their family members who reside in a particular state, region, or country. The Tenability Index shows where the money can be spent. In both indexes, "see" and "see also" references are used liberally, to help you find the funding that's right for you, and index entries for a particular geographic area are divided by both program type

and recipient group. When using these indexes, always check the listings under the term "United States," since the programs indexed there have no geographic restrictions and can be used in any area.

To Locate Financial Aid Programs for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families in a Particular Subject Area. Turn to the Subject Index first if you are interested in identifying financial aid programs for veterans, military personnel, or their family members that focus on a particular subject area. To help you structure your search, the type of funding indexed (scholarships, fellowships, grants-in-aid) and the recipient group (veterans, military personnel, family members) are clearly identified. Extensive cross-references are provided.

To Locate Financial Aid Programs for Veterans, Military Personnel, or Their Families by Deadline Date. If you are working with specific time constraints and want to weed out the financial aid programs whose filing dates you won't be able to meet, turn first to the Calendar Index and check the program references listed under the recipient group, program type, and month. Note: not all sponsoring organizations supplied deadline information; those programs are listed under the "Deadline not specified" entries in the index. To identify every relevant financial aid program, regardless of filing dates, read through all the entries in each of the program categories (scholarships, fellowships, grants-in-aid) and recipient subsections (veterans, military personnel, family members) that apply.

To Locate Financial Aid Programs Open to All Segments of the Population. Only programs available to individuals with ties to the military are listed in this publication. However, there are thousands of other programs that are open equally to all segments of the population. To identify these programs, talk to your local librarian, check with your financial aid office on campus, look at the list of RSP print resources on the page opposite the title page in this directory, or see if your library subscribes to Reference Service Press' interactive online funding database; for more information on that resource, go online to: www.rspfunding.com/esubscriptions.html.

PLANS TO UPDATE THE DIRECTORY

This volume, covering 2012-2014, is the thirteenth biennial edition of *Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Families*. The next edition will cover the years 2014-2016 and will be released in the first half of 2014.
